In the common laws of libel, it is frequently said that the "burden of proof" in English defamation law falls upon the defendant. While specific legal requirements may differ depending on local laws, the common laws of libel generally only require the claimant to prove that a statement was made by the defendant, and that it was defamatory – a relatively easy element to prove.

Defamation Law Made Simple "Defamation of character" is a catch-all term for any statement that hurts someone's reputation. Written defamation is called "libel," while spoken defamation is called "slander." Defamation is not a crime, but it is a " tort " (a civil wrong, rather than a criminal wrong).

Under English common law, conviction for libel generally required only that proof of a defamatory statement had been uttered. The truth of a statement was irrelevant.
